

## Proverbs 1

<sup>1</sup>These are the wise sayings of Solomon,  
David's son, Israel's king--

<sup>2</sup>Written down so we'll know how to live well and right,  
to understand what life means and where it's going;

<sup>3</sup>A manual for living,  
for learning what's right and just and fair;

<sup>4</sup>To teach the inexperienced the ropes  
and give our young people a grasp on reality.

<sup>5</sup>There's something here also for seasoned men and women,

<sup>6</sup>still a thing or two for the experienced to learn--  
Fresh wisdom to probe and penetrate,  
the rhymes and reasons of wise men and women.

### *Start with God*

<sup>7</sup>Start with GOD--the first step in learning is bowing down to GOD;  
only fools thumb their noses at such wisdom and learning.

<sup>8</sup>Pay close attention, friend, to what your father tells you;  
never forget what you learned at your mother's knee.

<sup>9</sup>Wear their counsel like flowers in your hair,  
like rings on your fingers.

<sup>10</sup>Dear friend, if bad companions tempt you,  
don't go along with them.

<sup>11</sup>If they say--"Let's go out and raise some hell.  
Let's beat up some old man, mug some old woman.

<sup>12</sup>Let's pick them clean  
and get them ready for their funerals.

<sup>13</sup>We'll load up on top-quality loot.  
We'll haul it home by the truckload.

<sup>14</sup>Join us for the time of your life!  
With us, it's share and share alike!"-

<sup>15</sup>Oh, friend, don't give them a second look;  
don't listen to them for a minute.

<sup>16</sup>They're racing to a very bad end,  
hurrying to ruin everything they lay hands on.

<sup>17</sup>Nobody robs a bank  
with everyone watching,

<sup>18</sup>Yet that's what these people are doing--  
they're doing themselves in.

<sup>19</sup>When you grab all you can get, that's what happens:  
the more you get, the less you are.

### *Lady Wisdom*

<sup>20</sup>Lady Wisdom goes out in the street and shouts.

At the town center she makes her speech.

<sup>21</sup>In the middle of the traffic she takes her stand.

At the busiest corner she calls out:

<sup>22</sup>"Simpletons! How long will you wallow in ignorance?

Cynics! How long will you feed your cynicism (sarcasm, distrust, doubt, skepticism)?

Idiots! How long will you refuse to learn?

<sup>23</sup>About face! I can revise your life.

Look, I'm ready to pour out my spirit on you;

I'm ready to tell you all I know.

<sup>24</sup>As it is, I've called, but you've turned a deaf ear;

I've reached out to you, but you've ignored me.

<sup>25</sup>"Since you laugh at my counsel

and make a joke of my advice,

<sup>26</sup>How can I take you seriously?

I'll turn the tables and joke about your troubles!

<sup>27</sup>What if the roof falls in,

and your whole life goes to pieces?

What if catastrophe strikes and there's nothing

to show for your life but rubble and ashes?

<sup>28</sup>You'll need me then. You'll call for me, but don't expect an answer.

No matter how hard you look, you won't find me.

<sup>29</sup>"Because you hated Knowledge

and had nothing to do with the Fear-of-GOD,

<sup>30</sup>Because you wouldn't take my advice

and brushed aside all my offers to train you,

<sup>31</sup>Well, you've made your bed--now lie in it;

you wanted your own way--now, how do you like it?

<sup>32</sup>Don't you see what happens, you simpletons, you idiots?

Carelessness kills; complacency is murder.

<sup>33</sup>First pay attention to me, and then relax.

Now you can take it easy--you're in good hands."

## Proverbs 2

### *Make Insight Your Priority*

<sup>1</sup>Good friend, take to heart what I'm telling you;  
collect my counsels and guard them with your life.

<sup>2</sup>Tune your ears to the world of Wisdom;  
set your heart on a life of Understanding.

<sup>3</sup>That's right--if you make Insight your priority,  
and won't take no for an answer,

<sup>4</sup>Searching for it like a prospector panning for gold,  
like an adventurer on a treasure hunt,

<sup>5</sup>Believe me, before you know it Fear-of-GOD will be yours;  
you'll have come upon the Knowledge of God.

<sup>6</sup>And here's why: GOD gives out Wisdom free,  
is plainspoken in Knowledge and Understanding.

<sup>7</sup>He's a rich mine of Common Sense for those who live well,  
a personal bodyguard to the candid and sincere.

<sup>8</sup>He keeps his eye on all who live honestly,  
and pays special attention to his loyally committed ones.

<sup>9</sup>So now you can pick out what's true and fair,  
find all the good trails!

<sup>10</sup>Lady Wisdom will be your close friend,  
and Brother Knowledge your pleasant companion.

<sup>11</sup>Good Sense will scout ahead for danger,  
Insight will keep an eye out for you.

<sup>12</sup>They'll keep you from making wrong turns,  
or following the bad directions

<sup>13</sup>Of those who are lost themselves  
and can't tell a trail from a tumbleweed,

<sup>14</sup>These losers who make a game of evil  
and throw parties to celebrate perversity,

<sup>15</sup>Traveling paths that go nowhere,  
wandering in a maze of detours and dead ends.

<sup>16</sup>Wise friends will rescue you from the Temptress--  
that smooth-talking Seductress

<sup>17</sup>Who's faithless to the husband she married years ago,  
never gave a second thought to her promises before God.

<sup>18</sup>Her whole way of life is doomed;  
every step she takes brings her closer to hell.

<sup>19</sup>No one who joins her company ever comes back,  
ever sets foot on the path to real living.

<sup>20</sup>So--join the company of good men and women,  
keep your feet on the tried and true paths.

<sup>21</sup>It's the men who walk straight who will settle this land,  
the women with integrity who will last here.

<sup>22</sup>The corrupt will lose their lives;  
the dishonest will be gone for good.

### **Proverbs 3**

#### *Don't Assume You Know It All*

<sup>1</sup>Good friend, don't forget all I've taught you;  
take to heart my commands.

<sup>2</sup>They'll help you live a long, long time,  
a long life lived full and well.

<sup>3</sup>Don't lose your grip on Love and Loyalty.  
Tie them around your neck; carve their initials on your heart.

<sup>4</sup>Earn a reputation for living well  
in God's eyes and the eyes of the people.

<sup>5</sup>Trust GOD from the bottom of your heart;  
don't try to figure out everything on your own.

<sup>6</sup>Listen for GOD's voice in everything you do, everywhere you go;  
he's the one who will keep you on track.

<sup>7</sup>Don't assume that you know it all.  
Run to GOD! Run from evil!

<sup>8</sup>Your body will glow with health,  
your very bones will vibrate with life!

<sup>9</sup>Honor GOD with everything you own;  
give him the first and the best.

<sup>10</sup>Your barns will burst,  
your wine vats will brim over.

<sup>11</sup>But don't, dear friend, resent GOD's discipline;  
don't sulk under his loving correction.

<sup>12</sup>It's the child he loves that GOD corrects;  
a father's delight is behind all this.

#### *The Very Tree of Life*

<sup>13</sup>You're blessed when you meet Lady Wisdom,  
when you make friends with Madame Insight.

<sup>14</sup>She's worth far more than money in the bank;  
her friendship is better than a big salary.

<sup>15</sup>Her value exceeds all the trappings of wealth;

nothing you could wish for holds a candle to her.

<sup>16</sup>With one hand she gives long life,  
with the other she confers recognition.

<sup>17</sup>Her manner is beautiful,  
her life wonderfully complete.

<sup>18</sup>She's the very Tree of Life to those who embrace her.

Hold her tight--and be blessed!

<sup>19</sup>With Lady Wisdom, GOD formed Earth;  
with Madame Insight, he raised Heaven.

<sup>20</sup>They knew when to signal rivers and springs to the surface,  
and dew to descend from the night skies.

### *Never Walk Away*

<sup>21</sup>Dear friend, guard Clear Thinking and Common Sense with your life;  
don't for a minute lose sight of them.

<sup>22</sup>They'll keep your soul alive and well,  
they'll keep you fit and attractive.

<sup>23</sup>You'll travel safely,  
you'll neither tire nor trip.

<sup>24</sup>You'll take afternoon naps without a worry,  
you'll enjoy a good night's sleep.

<sup>25</sup>No need to panic over alarms or surprises,  
or predictions that doomsday's just around the corner,

<sup>26</sup>Because GOD will be right there with you;  
he'll keep you safe and sound.

<sup>27</sup>Never walk away from someone who deserves help;  
your hand is God's hand for that person.

<sup>28</sup>Don't tell your neighbor, "Maybe some other time,"  
or, "Try me tomorrow,"  
when the money's right there in your pocket.

<sup>29</sup>Don't figure ways of taking advantage of your neighbor  
when he's sitting there trusting and unsuspecting.

<sup>30</sup>Don't walk around with a chip on your shoulder,  
always spoiling for a fight.

<sup>31</sup>Don't try to be like those who shoulder their way through life.  
Why be a bully?

<sup>32</sup>"Why not?" you say. Because GOD can't stand twisted souls.  
It's the straightforward who get his respect.

<sup>33</sup>GOD's curse blights the house of the wicked,  
but he blesses the home of the righteous.

<sup>34</sup>He gives proud skeptics a cold shoulder,  
but if you're down on your luck, he's right there to help.  
<sup>35</sup>Wise living gets rewarded with honor;  
stupid living gets the booby prize.

## Proverbs 4

### *Your Life Is at Stake*

<sup>1</sup>Listen, friends, to some fatherly advice;  
sit up and take notice so you'll know how to live.

<sup>2</sup>I'm giving you good counsel;  
don't let it go in one ear and out the other.

<sup>3</sup>When I was a boy at my father's knee,  
the pride and joy of my mother,

<sup>4</sup>He would sit me down and drill me:

"Take this to heart. Do what I tell you--live!

<sup>5</sup>Sell everything and buy Wisdom! Forage for Understanding!  
Don't forget one word! Don't deviate an inch!

<sup>6</sup>Never walk away from Wisdom--she guards your life;  
love her--she keeps her eye on you.

<sup>7</sup>Above all and before all, do this: Get Wisdom!  
Write this at the top of your list: Get Understanding!

<sup>8</sup>Throw your arms around her--believe me, you won't regret it;  
never let her go--she'll make your life glorious.

<sup>9</sup>She'll garland your life with grace,  
she'll festoon your days with beauty."

<sup>10</sup>Dear friend, take my advice;  
it will add years to your life.

<sup>11</sup>I'm writing out clear directions to Wisdom Way,  
I'm drawing a map to Righteous Road.

<sup>12</sup>I don't want you ending up in blind alleys,  
or wasting time making wrong turns.

<sup>13</sup>Hold tight to good advice; don't relax your grip.  
Guard it well--your life is at stake!

<sup>14</sup>Don't take Wicked Bypass;  
don't so much as set foot on that road.

<sup>15</sup>Stay clear of it; give it a wide berth.  
Make a detour and be on your way.

<sup>16</sup>Evil people are restless  
unless they're making trouble;

They can't get a good night's sleep  
unless they've made life miserable for somebody.

<sup>17</sup>Perversity is their food and drink,  
violence their drug of choice.

<sup>18</sup>The ways of right-living people glow with light;  
the longer they live, the brighter they shine.

<sup>19</sup>But the road of wrongdoing gets darker and darker--  
travelers can't see a thing; they fall flat on their faces.

### *Learn It by Heart*

<sup>20</sup>Dear friend, listen well to my words;  
tune your ears to my voice.

<sup>21</sup>Keep my message in plain view at all times.  
Concentrate! Learn it by heart!

<sup>22</sup>Those who discover these words live, really live;  
body and soul, they're bursting with health.

<sup>23</sup>Keep vigilant watch over your heart;  
that's where life starts.

<sup>24</sup>Don't talk out of both sides of your mouth;  
avoid careless banter, white lies, and gossip.

<sup>25</sup>Keep your eyes straight ahead;  
ignore all sideshow distractions.

<sup>26</sup>Watch your step,  
and the road will stretch out smooth before you.

<sup>27</sup>Look neither right nor left;  
leave evil in the dust.

## **Proverbs 5**

### *Nothing but Sin and Bones*

<sup>1</sup>Dear friend, pay close attention to this, my wisdom;  
listen very closely to the way I see it.

<sup>2</sup>Then you'll acquire a taste for good sense;  
what I tell you will keep you out of trouble.

<sup>3</sup>The lips of a seductive woman are oh so sweet,  
her soft words are oh so smooth.

<sup>4</sup>But it won't be long before she's gravel in your mouth,  
a pain in your gut, a wound in your heart.

<sup>5</sup>She's dancing down the primrose path to Death;

she's headed straight for Hell and taking you with her.  
<sup>6</sup>She hasn't a clue about Real Life,  
about who she is or where she's going.

<sup>7</sup>So, my friend, listen closely;  
don't treat my words casually.

<sup>8</sup>Keep your distance from such a woman;  
absolutely stay out of her neighborhood.

<sup>9</sup>You don't want to squander your wonderful life,  
to waste your precious life among the hardhearted.

<sup>10</sup>Why should you allow strangers to take advantage of you?  
Why be exploited by those who care nothing for you?

<sup>11</sup>You don't want to end your life full of regrets,  
nothing but sin and bones,

<sup>12</sup>Saying, "Oh, why didn't I do what they told me?  
Why did I reject a disciplined life?"

<sup>13</sup>Why didn't I listen to my mentors,  
or take my teachers seriously?

<sup>14</sup>My life is ruined!  
I haven't one blessed thing to show for my life!"

#### *Never Take Love for Granted*

<sup>15</sup>Do you know the saying, "Drink from your own rain barrel,  
draw water from your own spring-fed well"?

<sup>16</sup>It's true. Otherwise, you may one day come home  
and find your barrel empty and your well polluted.

<sup>17</sup>Your spring water is for you and you only,  
not to be passed around among strangers.

<sup>18</sup>Bless your fresh-flowing fountain!

Enjoy the wife you married as a young man!

<sup>19</sup>Lovely as an angel, beautiful as a rose--  
don't ever quit taking delight in her body.

Never take her love for granted!

<sup>20</sup>Why would you trade enduring intimacies for cheap thrills with a whore?  
for dalliance with a promiscuous stranger?

<sup>21</sup>Mark well that GOD doesn't miss a move you make;  
he's aware of every step you take.

<sup>22</sup>The shadow of your sin will overtake you;  
you'll find yourself stumbling all over yourself in the dark.

<sup>23</sup>Death is the reward of an undisciplined life;  
your foolish decisions trap you in a dead end.

## Proverbs 6

### *Like a Deer from the Hunter*

<sup>1</sup>Dear friend, if you've gone into hock with your neighbor  
or locked yourself into a deal with a stranger,

<sup>2</sup>If you've impulsively promised the shirt off your back  
and now find yourself shivering out in the cold,

<sup>3</sup>Friend, don't waste a minute, get yourself out of that mess.  
You're in that man's clutches!

Go, put on a long face; act desperate.

<sup>4</sup>Don't procrastinate--  
there's no time to lose.

<sup>5</sup>Run like a deer from the hunter,  
fly like a bird from the trapper!

### *A Lesson from the Ant*

<sup>6</sup>You lazy fool, look at an ant.

Watch it closely; let it teach you a thing or two.

<sup>7</sup>Nobody has to tell it what to do.

<sup>8</sup>All summer it stores up food;  
at harvest it stockpiles provisions.

<sup>9</sup>So how long are you going to laze around doing nothing?  
How long before you get out of bed?

<sup>10</sup>A nap here, a nap there, a day off here, a day off there,  
sit back, take it easy--do you know what comes next?

<sup>11</sup>Just this: You can look forward to a dirt-poor life,  
poverty your permanent houseguest!

### *Always Cooking Up Something Nasty*

<sup>12</sup>Riffraff and rascals  
talk out of both sides of their mouths.

<sup>13</sup>They wink at each other, they shuffle their feet,  
they cross their fingers behind their backs.

<sup>14</sup>Their perverse minds are always cooking up something nasty,  
always stirring up trouble.

<sup>15</sup>Catastrophe is just around the corner for them,  
a total smash-up, their lives ruined beyond repair.

### *Seven Things God Hates*

<sup>16</sup>Here are six things GOD hates,  
and one more that he loathes with a passion:

<sup>17</sup>eyes that are arrogant,  
a tongue that lies,  
hands that murder the innocent,  
<sup>18</sup>a heart that hatches evil plots,  
feet that race down a wicked track,  
<sup>19</sup>a mouth that lies under oath,  
a troublemaker in the family.

### *Warning on Adultery*

<sup>20</sup>Good friend, follow your father's good advice;  
don't wander off from your mother's teachings.

<sup>21</sup>Wrap yourself in them from head to foot;  
wear them like a scarf around your neck.

<sup>22</sup>Wherever you walk, they'll guide you;  
whenever you rest, they'll guard you;  
when you wake up, they'll tell you what's next.

<sup>23</sup>For sound advice is a beacon,  
good teaching is a light,  
moral discipline is a life path.

<sup>24</sup>They'll protect you from wanton women,  
from the seductive talk of some temptress.

<sup>25</sup>Don't lustfully fantasize on her beauty,  
nor be taken in by her bedroom eyes.

<sup>26</sup>You can buy an hour with a whore for a loaf of bread,  
but a wanton woman may well eat you alive.

<sup>27</sup>Can you build a fire in your lap  
and not burn your pants?

<sup>28</sup>Can you walk barefoot on hot coals  
and not get blisters?

<sup>29</sup>It's the same when you have sex with your neighbor's wife:  
Touch her and you'll pay for it. No excuses.

<sup>30</sup>Hunger is no excuse  
for a thief to steal;

<sup>31</sup>When he's caught he has to pay it back,  
even if he has to put his whole house in hock.

<sup>32</sup>Adultery is a brainless act,  
soul--destroying, self-destructive;

<sup>33</sup>Expect a bloody nose, a black eye,  
and a reputation ruined for good.

<sup>34</sup>For jealousy detonates rage in a cheated husband;  
wild for revenge, he won't make allowances.

<sup>35</sup>Nothing you say or pay will make it all right;

neither bribes nor reason will satisfy him.

## Proverbs 7

### *Dressed to Seduce*

<sup>1</sup>Dear friend, do what I tell you;  
treasure my careful instructions.  
<sup>2</sup>Do what I say and you'll live well.  
My teaching is as precious as your eyesight--guard it!  
<sup>3</sup>Write it out on the back of your hands;  
etch it on the chambers of your heart.  
<sup>4</sup>Talk to Wisdom as to a sister.  
Treat Insight as your companion.  
<sup>5</sup>They'll be with you to fend off the Temptress--

that smooth-talking, honey--tongued Seductress.  
<sup>6</sup>As I stood at the window of my house  
looking out through the shutters,  
<sup>7</sup>Watching the mindless crowd stroll by,  
I spotted a young man without any sense  
<sup>8</sup>Arriving at the corner of the street where she lived,  
then turning up the path to her house.  
<sup>9</sup>It was dusk, the evening coming on,  
the darkness thickening into night.  
<sup>10</sup>Just then, a woman met him--  
she'd been lying in wait for him, dressed to seduce him.  
<sup>11</sup>Brazen and brash she was,  
restless and roaming, never at home,  
<sup>12</sup>Walking the streets, loitering in the mall,  
hanging out at every corner in town.

<sup>13</sup>She threw her arms around him and kissed him,  
boldly took his arm and said,  
<sup>14</sup>"I've got all the makings for a feast--  
today I made my offerings, my vows are all paid,  
<sup>15</sup>So now I've come to find you,  
hoping to catch sight of your face--and here you are!  
<sup>16</sup>I've spread fresh, clean sheets on my bed,  
colorful imported linens.  
<sup>17</sup>My bed is aromatic with spices  
and exotic fragrances.  
<sup>18</sup>Come, let's make love all night,  
spend the night in ecstatic lovemaking!  
<sup>19-20</sup>My husband's not home; he's away on business,  
and he won't be back for a month."

<sup>21</sup>Soon she has him eating out of her hand,

bewitched by her honeyed speech.

<sup>22</sup>Before you know it, he's trotting behind her,  
like a calf led to the butcher shop,

Like a stag lured into ambush

<sup>23</sup>and then shot with an arrow,

Like a bird flying into a net  
not knowing that its flying life is over.

<sup>24</sup>So, friends, listen to me,

take these words of mine most seriously.

<sup>25</sup>Don't fool around with a woman like that;  
don't even stroll through her neighborhood.

<sup>26</sup>Countless victims come under her spell;  
she's the death of many a poor man.

<sup>27</sup>She runs a halfway house to hell,  
fits you out with a shroud and a coffin.

## Proverbs 8

### *Lady Wisdom Calls Out*

<sup>1</sup>Do you hear Lady Wisdom calling?  
Can you hear Madame Insight raising her voice?

<sup>2</sup>She's taken her stand at First and Main,  
at the busiest intersection.

<sup>3</sup>Right in the city square  
where the traffic is thickest, she shouts,

<sup>4</sup>"You--I'm talking to all of you,  
everyone out here on the streets!

<sup>5</sup>Listen, you idiots--learn good sense!  
You blockheads--shape up!

<sup>6</sup>Don't miss a word of this--I'm telling you how to live well,  
I'm telling you how to live at your best.

<sup>7</sup>My mouth chews and savors and relishes truth--  
I can't stand the taste of evil!

<sup>8</sup>You'll only hear true and right words from my mouth;  
not one syllable will be twisted or skewed.

<sup>9</sup>You'll recognize this as true--you with open minds;  
truth--ready minds will see it at once.

<sup>10</sup>Prefer my life--disciplines over chasing after money,  
and God-knowledge over a lucrative career.

<sup>11</sup>For Wisdom is better than all the trappings of wealth;  
nothing you could wish for holds a candle to her.

<sup>12</sup>"I am Lady Wisdom, and I live next to Sanity;  
Knowledge and Discretion live just down the street.

<sup>13</sup>The Fear-of-GOD means hating Evil,  
whose ways I hate with a passion--  
pride and arrogance and crooked talk.

<sup>14</sup>Good counsel and common sense are my characteristics;  
I am both Insight and the Virtue to live it out.

<sup>15</sup>With my help, leaders rule,  
and lawmakers legislate fairly;

<sup>16</sup>With my help, governors govern,  
along with all in legitimate authority.

<sup>17</sup>I love those who love me;  
those who look for me find me.

<sup>18</sup>Wealth and Glory accompany me--  
also substantial Honor and a Good Name.

<sup>19</sup>My benefits are worth more than a big salary, even a very big salary;  
the returns on me exceed any imaginable bonus.

<sup>20</sup>You can find me on Righteous Road--that's where I walk--  
at the intersection of Justice Avenue,

<sup>21</sup>Handing out life to those who love me,

filling their arms with life--armloads of life!

<sup>22</sup>"GOD sovereignly made me--the first, the basic--  
before he did anything else.

<sup>23</sup>I was brought into being a long time ago,  
well before Earth got its start.

<sup>24</sup>I arrived on the scene before Ocean,  
yes, even before Springs and Rivers and Lakes.

<sup>25</sup>Before Mountains were sculpted and Hills took shape,  
I was already there, newborn;

<sup>26</sup>Long before GOD stretched out Earth's Horizons,  
and tended to the minute details of Soil and Weather,

<sup>27</sup>And set Sky firmly in place,

I was there.

When he mapped and gave borders to wild Ocean,

<sup>28</sup>built the vast vault of Heaven,  
and installed the fountains that fed Ocean,

<sup>29</sup>When he drew a boundary for Sea,  
posted a sign that said, NO TRESPASSING,  
And then staked out Earth's foundations,

<sup>30</sup>I was right there with him, making sure everything fit.

Day after day I was there, with my joyful applause,  
always enjoying his company,

<sup>31</sup>Delighted with the world of things and creatures,  
happily celebrating the human family.

<sup>32</sup>"So, my dear friends, listen carefully;  
those who embrace these my ways are most blessed.  
<sup>33</sup>Mark a life of discipline and live wisely;  
don't squander your precious life.  
<sup>34</sup>Blessed the man, blessed the woman, who listens to me,  
awake and ready for me each morning,  
alert and responsive as I start my day's work.  
<sup>35</sup>When you find me, you find life, real life,  
to say nothing of GOD's good pleasure.  
<sup>36</sup>But if you wrong me, you damage your very soul;  
when you reject me, you're flirting with death."

## Proverbs 9

### *Lady Wisdom Gives a Dinner Party*

<sup>1</sup>Lady Wisdom has built and furnished her home;  
it's supported by seven hewn timbers.  
<sup>2</sup>The banquet meal is ready to be served: lamb roasted,  
wine poured out, table set with silver and flowers.  
<sup>3</sup>Having dismissed her serving maids,  
Lady Wisdom goes to town, stands in a prominent place,  
and invites everyone within sound of her voice:  
<sup>4</sup>"Are you confused about life, don't know what's going on?  
Come with me, oh come, have dinner with me!

tell good people what you know--they'll profit from it.  
<sup>10</sup>Skilled living gets its start in the Fear-of-GOD,  
insight into life from knowing a Holy God.  
<sup>11</sup>It's through me, Lady Wisdom, that your life deepens,  
and the years of your life ripen.  
<sup>12</sup>Live wisely and wisdom will permeate your life;  
mock life and life will mock you.

*Madame Whore Calls Out, Too*

<sup>13</sup>Then there's this other woman, Madame Whore--  
brazen, empty-headed, frivolous.

<sup>14</sup>She sits on the front porch  
of her house on Main Street,

<sup>15</sup>And as people walk by minding  
their own business, calls out,

<sup>16</sup>"Are you confused about life, don't know what's going on?

<sup>17</sup>Steal off with me, I'll show you a good time!

No one will ever know--I'll give you the time of your life."

<sup>18</sup>But they don't know about all the skeletons in her closet,  
that all her guests end up in hell.

but the mouth of the wicked is a dark cave of abuse.

<sup>12</sup>Hatred starts fights,  
but love pulls a quilt over the bickering.

<sup>13</sup>You'll find wisdom on the lips of a person of insight,  
but the shortsighted needs a slap in the face.

<sup>14</sup>The wise accumulate knowledge--a true treasure;  
know--it--alls talk too much--a sheer waste.

*The Road to Life Is a Disciplined Life*

<sup>15</sup>The wealth of the rich is their bastion;  
the poverty of the indigent is their ruin.

<sup>16</sup>The wage of a good person is exuberant life;  
an evil person ends up with nothing but sin.

<sup>17</sup>The road to life is a disciplined life;  
ignore correction and you're lost for good.

<sup>18</sup>Liars secretly hoard hatred;  
fools openly spread slander.

<sup>19</sup>The more talk, the less truth;

<sup>20</sup>The speech of a good person is worth waiting for;  
the blabber of the wicked is worthless.

<sup>26</sup>It's wrong to penalize good behavior,  
or make good citizens pay for the crimes of others.

<sup>27</sup>The one who knows much says little;  
an understanding person remains calm.

<sup>28</sup>Even dunces who keep quiet are thought to be wise;  
as long as they keep their mouths shut, they're smart.

## Proverbs 18

*Words Kill, Words Give Life*

<sup>1</sup>Loners who care only for themselves  
spit on the common good.

<sup>2</sup>Fools care nothing for thoughtful discourse;  
all they do is run off at the mouth.

<sup>3</sup>When wickedness arrives, shame's not far behind;  
contempt for life is contemptible.

<sup>4</sup>Many words rush along like rivers in flood,  
but deep wisdom flows up from artesian springs.

<sup>5</sup>It's not right to go easy on the guilty,

<sup>8</sup>Listening to gossip is like eating cheap candy;

<sup>10</sup>GOD's name is a place of protection--  
good people can run there and be safe.

<sup>11</sup>The rich think their wealth protects them;  
they imagine themselves safe behind it.

<sup>12</sup>Pride first, then the crash,  
but humility is precursor to honor.

<sup>13</sup>Answering before listening  
is both stupid and rude.

<sup>14</sup>A healthy spirit conquers adversity,  
but what can you do when the spirit is crushed?

<sup>15</sup>Wise men and women are always learning,  
always listening for fresh insights.

<sup>16</sup>A gift gets attention;  
it buys the attention of eminent people.

<sup>9</sup>Better to live alone in a tumbledown shack than share a mansion with a nagging spouse.

<sup>10</sup>Wicked souls love to make trouble; they feel nothing for friends and neighbors.

<sup>11</sup>Simpletons only learn the hard way, but the wise learn by listening.

<sup>12</sup>A God-loyal person will see right through the wicked and undo the evil they've planned.

<sup>13</sup>If you stop your ears to the cries of the poor, your cries will go unheard, unanswered.

<sup>14</sup>A quietly given gift soothes an irritable person;  
a heartfelt present cools a hot temper.

<sup>15</sup>Good people celebrate when justice triumphs,  
but for the workers of evil it's a bad day.

<sup>16</sup>Whoever wanders off the straight and narrow  
ends up in a congregation of ghosts.

<sup>17</sup>You're addicted to thrills? What an empty life!  
The pursuit of pleasure is never satisfied.

<sup>18</sup>What a bad person plots against the good, boomerangs;  
the plotter gets it in the end.

<sup>19</sup>Better to live in a tent in the wild  
than with a cross and petulant spouse.

<sup>20</sup>Valuables are safe in a wise person's home;  
fools put it all out for yard sales.

<sup>21</sup>Whoever goes hunting for what is right and kind  
finds life itself--glorious life!

<sup>22</sup>One sage entered a whole city of armed soldiers--  
their trusted defenses fell to pieces!

<sup>23</sup>Watch your words and hold your tongue;  
you'll save yourself a lot of grief.

<sup>24</sup>You know their names--Brash, Impudent, Blasphemer--  
intemperate hotheads, every one.

<sup>25</sup>Lazy people finally die of hunger  
because they won't get up and go to work.

<sup>26</sup>Sinners are always wanting what they don't have;  
the God-loyal are always giving what they do have.

<sup>27</sup>Religious performance by the wicked stinks;  
it's even worse when they use it to get ahead.

<sup>28</sup>A lying witness is unconvincing;  
a person who speaks truth is respected.

<sup>29</sup>Unscrupulous people fake it a lot;  
honest people are sure of their steps.

<sup>30</sup>Nothing clever, nothing conceived, nothing contrived,  
can get the better of GOD.

<sup>31</sup>Do your best, prepare for the worst--  
then trust GOD to bring victory.

### *The Cure Comes Through Discipline*

<sup>1</sup>A sterling reputation is better than striking it rich;  
a gracious spirit is better than money in the bank.

<sup>2</sup>The rich and the poor shake hands as equals--

when they're old they won't be lost.

<sup>7</sup>The poor are always ruled over by the rich,  
so don't borrow and put yourself under their power.

<sup>8</sup>Whoever sows sin reaps weeds,  
and bullying anger sputters into nothing.

<sup>9</sup>Generous hands are blessed hands  
because they give bread to the poor.

<sup>10</sup>Kick out the troublemakers and things will quiet down;  
you need a break from bickering and griping!

<sup>11</sup>GOD loves the pure-hearted and well-spoken;  
good leaders also delight in their friendship.

<sup>12</sup>GOD guards knowledge with a passion,  
but he'll have nothing to do with deception.

<sup>13</sup>The loafer says, "There's a lion on the loose!  
If I go out I'll be eaten alive!"

<sup>14</sup>The mouth of a whore is a bottomless pit;

you'll fall in that pit if you're on the outs with GOD.

<sup>15</sup>Young people are prone to foolishness and fads;  
the cure comes through tough-minded discipline.

<sup>16</sup>Exploit the poor or glad-hand the rich--whichever,  
you'll end up the poorer for it.

<sup>17</sup>Listen carefully to my wisdom;  
take to heart what I can teach you.

You'll treasure its sweetness deep within;

<sup>18</sup>you'll give it bold expression in your speech.

<sup>19</sup>To make sure your foundation is trust in GOD,  
I'm laying it all out right now just for you.

<sup>20</sup>I'm giving you thirty sterling principles--  
tested guidelines to live by.

<sup>21</sup>Believe me--these are truths that work,  
and will keep you accountable

to those who sent you. <sup>22</sup>Don't walk on the poor just because they're poor,  
and don't use your position to crush the weak,

<sup>23</sup>Because GOD will come to their defense;

the life you took, he'll take from you and give back to them. <sup>24</sup>Don't hang out with angry people;  
don't keep company with hotheads.

<sup>25</sup>Bad temper is contagious--

don't get infected. <sup>26</sup>Don't gamble on the pot of gold at the end of the rainbow,  
hocking your house against a lucky chance.

<sup>27</sup>The time will come when you have to pay up;

you'll be left with nothing but the shirt on your back. <sup>28</sup>Don't stealthily move back the boundary  
lines

staked out long ago by your ancestors. <sup>29</sup>Observe people who are good at their work--  
skilled workers are always in demand and admired;

they don't take a back seat to anyone.

## Proverbs 23

### *Restrain Yourself*

<sup>1</sup>When you go out to dinner with an influential person,  
mind your manners:  
<sup>2</sup>Don't gobble your food,

soak yourself in the Fear-of-GOD-

Then you won't be left with an armload of nothing. <sup>19</sup>Oh listen, dear child--become wise;  
point your life in the right direction.  
<sup>20</sup>Don't drink too much wine and get drunk;  
don't eat too much food and get fat.  
<sup>21</sup>Drunks and gluttons will end up on skid row,  
in a stupor and dressed in rags.

### *Buy Wisdom, Education, Insight*

<sup>22</sup>Listen with respect to the father who raised you,  
and when your mother grows old, don't neglect her.  
<sup>23</sup>Buy truth--don't sell it for love or money;  
buy wisdom, buy education, buy insight.  
<sup>24</sup>Parents rejoice when their children turn out well;  
wise children become proud parents.  
<sup>25</sup>So make your father happy!

Make your mother proud! <sup>26</sup>Dear child, I want your full attention;  
please do what I show you.

<sup>27</sup>A whore is a bottomless pit;  
a loose woman can get you in deep trouble fast.

<sup>28</sup>She'll take you for all you've got;  
she's worse than a pack of thieves. <sup>29</sup>Who are the people who are always crying the blues?  
Who do you know who reeks of self-pity?  
Who keeps getting beat up for no reason at all?  
Whose eyes are bleary and bloodshot?

<sup>30</sup>It's those who spend the night with a bottle,  
for whom drinking is serious business.

<sup>31</sup>Don't judge wine by its label,  
or its bouquet, or its full-bodied flavor.

<sup>32</sup>Judge it rather by the hangover it leaves you with--  
the splitting headache, the queasy stomach.

<sup>33</sup>Do you really prefer seeing double,  
with your speech all slurred,

<sup>34</sup>Reeling and seasick,  
drunk as a sailor?

<sup>35</sup>"They hit me," you'll say, "but it didn't hurt;  
they beat on me, but I didn't feel a thing.  
When I'm sober enough to manage it,  
bring me another drink!"

## Proverbs 24

### *Intelligence Outranks Muscle*

<sup>1</sup>Don't envy bad people;  
don't even want to be around them.  
<sup>2</sup>All they think about is causing a disturbance;

and a stick for the back of fools!

<sup>4</sup>Don't respond to the stupidity of a fool;  
you'll only look foolish yourself.

<sup>5</sup>Answer a fool in simple terms  
so he doesn't get a swelled head.

<sup>6</sup>You're only asking for trouble  
when you send a message by a fool.

<sup>7</sup>A proverb quoted by fools  
is limp as a wet noodle.

<sup>8</sup>Putting a fool in a place of honor  
is like setting a mud brick on a marble column.

<sup>9</sup>To ask a moron to quote a proverb  
is like putting a scalpel in the hands of a drunk.

<sup>10</sup>Hire a fool or a drunk  
and you shoot yourself in the foot.

<sup>11</sup>As a dog eats its own vomit,  
so fools recycle silliness.

<sup>12</sup>See that man who thinks he's so smart?  
You can expect far more from a fool than from him.

<sup>13</sup>Loafers say, "It's dangerous out there!  
Tigers are prowling the streets!"  
and then pull the covers back over their heads.

<sup>14</sup>Just as a door turns on its hinges,  
so a lazybones turns back over in bed.

<sup>15</sup>A shiftless sluggard puts his fork in the pie,  
but is too lazy to lift it to his mouth.

eventually his evil will be exposed in public.

<sup>27</sup>Malice backfires;  
spite boomerangs.

<sup>28</sup>Liars hate their victims;  
flatterers sabotage trust.

### *You Don't Know Tomorrow*

<sup>1</sup>Don't brashly announce what you're going to do tomorrow;  
you don't know the first thing about tomorrow.

<sup>2</sup>Don't call attention to yourself;  
let others do that for you.

<sup>3</sup>Carrying a log across your shoulders  
while you're hefting a boulder with your arms  
Is nothing compared to the burden  
of putting up with a fool.

<sup>4</sup>We're blasted by anger and swamped by rage,  
but who can survive jealousy?

<sup>5</sup>A spoken reprimand is better  
than approval that's never expressed.

<sup>6</sup>The wounds from a lover are worth it;  
kisses from an enemy do you in.

<sup>7</sup>When you've stuffed yourself, you refuse dessert;  
when you're starved, you could eat a horse.

<sup>8</sup>People who won't settle down, wandering hither and yon,  
are like restless birds, flitting to and fro.

<sup>9</sup>Just as lotions and fragrance give sensual delight,  
a sweet friendship refreshes the soul.

<sup>10</sup>Don't leave your friends or your parents' friends  
and run home to your family when things get rough;  
Better a nearby friend  
than a distant family.

<sup>11</sup>Become wise, dear child, and make me happy;  
then nothing the world throws my way will upset me.

<sup>12</sup>A prudent person sees trouble coming and ducks;  
a simpleton walks in blindly and is clobbered.

<sup>13</sup>Hold tight to collateral on any loan to a stranger;  
be wary of accepting what a transient has pawned.

<sup>14</sup>If you wake your friend in the early morning  
by shouting "Rise and shine!"  
It will sound to him  
more like a curse than a blessing.

<sup>15</sup>A nagging spouse is like  
the drip, drip, drip of a leaky faucet;

<sup>16</sup>You can't turn it off,  
and you can't get away from it.

*Your Face Mirrors Your Heart*

<sup>17</sup>You use steel to sharpen steel,  
and one friend sharpens another.

<sup>18</sup>If you care for your orchard, you'll enjoy its fruit;  
if you honor your boss, you'll be honored.

<sup>19</sup>Just as water mirrors your face,  
so your face mirrors your heart.

<sup>20</sup>Hell has a voracious appetite,  
and lust just never quits.

<sup>21</sup>The purity of silver and gold is tested  
by putting them in the fire;  
The purity of human hearts is tested  
by giving them a little fame.

<sup>22</sup>Pound on a fool all you like--  
you can't pound out foolishness.

<sup>23</sup>Know your sheep by name;  
carefully attend to your flocks;  
<sup>24</sup>(Don't take them for granted;  
possessions don't last forever, you know.)  
<sup>25</sup>And then, when the crops are in  
and the harvest is stored in the barns,  
<sup>26</sup>You can knit sweaters from lambs' wool,  
and sell your goats for a profit;  
<sup>27</sup>There will be plenty of milk and meat  
to last your family through the winter.

## **Proverbs 28**

### *If You Desert God's Law*

<sup>1</sup>The wicked are edgy with guilt, ready to run off  
even when no one's after them;  
Honest people are relaxed and confident,  
bold as lions.

<sup>2</sup>When the country is in chaos,  
everybody has a plan to fix it--  
But it takes a leader of real understanding  
to straighten things out.

<sup>3</sup>The wicked who oppress the poor  
are like a hailstorm that beats down the harvest.

<sup>4</sup>If you desert God's law, you're free to embrace depravity;  
if you love God's law, you fight for it tooth and nail.

<sup>5</sup>Justice makes no sense to the evilminded;

those who seek GOD know it inside and out.

<sup>6</sup>It's better to be poor and direct  
than rich and crooked.

<sup>7</sup>Practice God's law--get a reputation for wisdom;

hang out with a loose crowd--embarrass your family.

<sup>8</sup>Get as rich as you want  
through cheating and extortion,  
But eventually some friend of the poor  
is going to give it all back to them.

<sup>9</sup>God has no use for the prayers  
of the people who won't listen to him.

<sup>10</sup>Lead good people down a wrong path  
and you'll come to a bad end;  
do good and you'll be rewarded for it.

<sup>11</sup>The rich think they know it all,  
but the poor can see right through them.

<sup>12</sup>When good people are promoted, everything is great,  
but when the bad are in charge, watch out!

<sup>13</sup>You can't whitewash your sins and get by with it;  
you find mercy by admitting and leaving them.

<sup>14</sup>A tenderhearted person lives a blessed life;  
a hardhearted person lives a hard life.

<sup>15</sup>Lions roar and bears charge--  
and the wicked lord it over the poor.

<sup>16</sup>Among leaders who lack insight, abuse abounds,  
but for one who hates corruption, the future is bright.

<sup>17</sup>A murderer haunted by guilt

is doomed--there's no helping him.

<sup>18</sup>Walk straight--live well and be saved;

a devious life is a doomed life.

*Doing Great Harm in Seemingly Harmless Ways*

<sup>19</sup>Work your garden--you'll end up with plenty of food;

play and party--you'll end up with an empty plate.

<sup>20</sup>Committed and persistent work pays off;  
get-rich-quick schemes are ripoffs.

<sup>21</sup>Playing favorites is always a bad thing;  
you can do great harm in seemingly harmless ways.

<sup>22</sup>A miser in a hurry to get rich  
doesn't know that he'll end up broke.

<sup>23</sup>In the end, serious reprimand is appreciated  
far more than bootlicking flattery.

<sup>24</sup>Anyone who robs father and mother  
and says, "So, what's wrong with that?"  
is worse than a pirate.

<sup>25</sup>A grasping person stirs up trouble,  
but trust in GOD brings a sense of well-being.

<sup>26</sup>If you think you know it all, you're a fool for sure;  
real survivors learn wisdom from others.

<sup>27</sup>Be generous to the poor--you'll never go hungry;  
shut your eyes to their needs, and run a gauntlet of curses.

<sup>28</sup>When corruption takes over, good people go underground,  
but when the crooks are thrown out, it's safe to come out.

*If People Can't See What God Is Doing*

gets only scorn and sarcasm for his trouble.

<sup>10</sup>Murderers hate honest people;  
moral folks encourage them.

<sup>11</sup>A fool lets it all hang out;  
a sage quietly mulls it over.

<sup>12</sup>When a leader listens to malicious gossip,  
all the workers get infected with evil.

<sup>13</sup>The poor and their abusers have at least something in common:  
they can both see--their sight, GOD's gift!

<sup>14</sup>Leadership gains authority and respect  
when the voiceless poor are treated fairly.

<sup>15</sup>Wise discipline imparts wisdom;  
spoiled adolescents embarrass their parents.

<sup>16</sup>When degenerates take charge, crime runs wild,  
but the righteous will eventually observe their collapse.

<sup>17</sup>Discipline your children; you'll be glad you did--  
they'll turn out delightful to live with.

<sup>18</sup>If people can't see what God is doing,  
they stumble all over themselves;  
But when they attend to what he reveals,  
they are most blessed.

<sup>19</sup>It takes more than talk to keep workers in line;  
mere words go in one ear and out the other.

<sup>20</sup>Observe the people who always talk before they think--  
even simpletons are better off than they are.

<sup>21</sup>If you let people treat you like a doormat,  
you'll be quite forgotten in the end.

<sup>22</sup>Angry people stir up a lot of discord;  
the intemperate stir up trouble.

<sup>23</sup>Pride lands you flat on your face;  
humility prepares you for honors.

<sup>24</sup>Befriend an outlaw  
and become an enemy to yourself.  
When the victims cry out,  
you'll be included in their curses  
if you're a coward to their cause in court.

<sup>25</sup>The fear of human opinion disables;

trusting in GOD protects you from that.

<sup>26</sup>Everyone tries to get help from the leader,  
but only GOD will give us justice.

<sup>27</sup>Good people can't stand the sight of deliberate evil;  
the wicked can't stand the sight of well-chosen goodness.  
The Words of Agur Ben Yakeh  
God? Who Needs Him?

<sup>10</sup>A good woman is hard to find,  
and worth far more than diamonds.

<sup>11</sup>Her husband trusts her without reserve,  
and never has reason to regret it.

<sup>12</sup>Never spiteful, she treats him generously  
all her life long.

<sup>13</sup>She shops around for the best yarns and cottons,  
and enjoys knitting and sewing.

<sup>14</sup>She's like a trading ship that sails to faraway places  
and brings back exotic surprises.

<sup>15</sup>She's up before dawn, preparing breakfast  
for her family and organizing her day.

<sup>16</sup>She looks over a field and buys it,  
then, with money she's put aside, plants a garden.

<sup>17</sup>First thing in the morning, she dresses for work,  
rolls up her sleeves, eager to get started.

<sup>18</sup>She senses the worth of her work,  
is in no hurry to call it quits for the day.

<sup>19</sup>She's skilled in the crafts of home and hearth,  
diligent in homemaking.

<sup>20</sup>She's quick to assist anyone in need,  
reaches out to help the poor.

<sup>21</sup>She doesn't worry about her family when it snows;  
their winter clothes are all mended and ready to wear.

<sup>22</sup>She makes her own clothing,  
and dresses in colorful linens and silks.

<sup>23</sup>Her husband is greatly respected  
when he deliberates with the city fathers.

<sup>24</sup>She designs gowns and sells them,  
brings the sweaters she knits to the dress shops.

<sup>25</sup>Her clothes are well-made and elegant,  
and she always faces tomorrow with a smile.

<sup>26</sup>When she speaks she has something worthwhile to say,  
and she always says it kindly.

<sup>27</sup>She keeps an eye on everyone in her household,  
and keeps them all busy and productive.

<sup>28</sup>Her children respect and bless her;

her husband joins in with words of praise:

<sup>29</sup>"Many women have done wonderful things,  
but you've outclassed them all!"

<sup>30</sup>Charm can mislead and beauty soon fades.

The woman to be admired and praised  
is the woman who lives in the Fear-of-GOD.

<sup>31</sup>Give her everything she deserves!

Festoon her life with praises!
